The research library will be selling duplicate and out-of-field books, which include hundreds of titles relating to Oregon history, as well as general U.S. history and many other subjects. Most items will be **priced from \$1.00-\$5.00!** All of the books duplicate existing OHS holdings or are outside the OHS collecting scope. **Nothing from the Society's permanent collections is being sold.**

Also included will be duplicate photographic prints copied from the Society's vast holdings, including images of Portland and other locales in Oregon and the Pacific Northwest.
